Empathy: awareness of others' feelings in a particular situation.

Self-Awareness: awareness of one's own personality, attitude, behaviors, and privilege.

Graciousness: a generosity of spirit including benevolence, courteousness, and kindness toward others.

Magnanimity: the ability to bear trouble calmly and to refrain from meanness and pettiness.

Provisionalism: engaging in dialogue with a willingness to listen to other perspectives, gain new knowledge, be challenged, and possibly even be persuaded.
